There is no doubt about it, parenting children in today's technology and media saturated world is challenging. "About 96% of Americans have a TV and 94% of children ages 3 to 18 access the Internet either through a computer or smartphone. According to a national survey done by Common Sense Media in 2019, 53% of children have a smartphone by the time they turn 11."<sup>11</sup> It is imperative for parents to understand the effects of technology on their children. Following is a short overview to the research in this area.

Technology can have both negative and positive impacts on children. The question each parent must ask is, "What am I comfortable with?"

Let's look at the **NEGATIVE CONCERNS** first.

1. The amount of time children (and even adults) are spending on technology is skyrocketing. "The average 8 to 10-year-olds spend almost 8 hours a day with a variety of media and teenagers spend around 11 hours day with media."<sup>2</sup> Some are online as late as 2 AM. This has caused a drop in grades because students are tired, not doing homework and struggling with math and reading.

2. Social skills are not being developed, causing social awkwardness, withdrawal from others and shyness. Children and teens are losing the ability to engage with other humans. They prefer their virtual reality.<sup>1</sup> This is causing difficulties for some children in forming relationships with other humans. What will happen to our society? Will computer-generated AI (artificial intelligence) characters become our loved ones?

3. Our children's physical and mental heath is also at stake. Today we in the USA are experiencing a rise in child obesity. "For children and adolescents aged 2-19 years in 2017-2018, the prevalence of obesity was 19.3% and affected about 14.4 million children and adolescents."<sup>3</sup> This is causing an epidemic of Type 2 diabetes in this age group. There is a fear that many of today's children will not out live their parents. All this is largely due to sitting in front of screen eating for hours instead of playing outside. 4. Because of social media, teens are becoming depressed because their lives seem boring compared to the "exciting" lives of other teens. Unfortunately, many of the posts they are looking at are carefully curated and some are just made up.<sup>2</sup>

5. Another problem is cyber bullying. From the safety of screen anonymity, a child can attack those they don't like and get their friends to do the same. The pressure of this kind of attack has caused children and teens to become depressed and, in some cases, to commit suicide.<sup>2</sup>

6. The danger of unregulated web browsing is possibly exposing children to sites that could recruit them to radical organizations, violent games and porn sites. There is also the danger of interactions with strangers that lure children into dangerous adult relationship or into human trafficking.

#### POSITIVE ASPECTS OF TECHNOLOGY

1. Technology has provided alternate ways to learn. These include apps or sites that help with math, reading and spelling. Also, there are apps for phones that have helped in science and math.

2. Technology teaches development of research skills and life skills and provides options for visual learners.

3. Students get to experience other cultures through virtual sister schools from other countries.

4. Children are prepared for future careers in technology or information technology.

5. Children can learn to improve problem solving and decision making through apps and games which require the child to think versus mindless play.

#### WHAT TO DO

1. One of the most important things to do is regulate the amount of time your children are on technology for non-education use. One hour a day for young children and two hours a day for teens.

2. Resist the urge to use technology as a babysitter. Provide other avenues of activity such as sports teams, play dates with other children without tech involved.

3. Match screen time hour for hour of fresh air and sunshine. Take your children to forests, parks, mountains, meadows, or beaches. Many children are losing opportunities to experience "God's second book" – nature. Nature has a soothing and mental well-being effect on everyone.

4. Read real books together and have family worship at night.

5. Don't let your guard down on holidays and binge on movies and video games as a "family activity" together. Limit them and go outside and play games, have a scavenger hunt, plant something together.

6. Remember, social media can be as addicting as any drug. If you are a parent of young children, remember you are a role model. Do you need to reign in your technology and reengage with your family?

1. The programs are designed for specific age ranges. Your child may be frustrated or bored if he/she attends a program out of his/ her age group. (See schedule for ranges.)


2. If you want to visit with other parents, please go outside to limit the distraction to the children.

#### To Whom Do You Owe Allegiance?

Growing up, we said the Pledge of Allegiance every morning in school – public and Adventist elementary. It was the thing to do. We were all Americans, right? This is way before I realized anything about politics, political parties and how our government worked.

In my senior year of academy, I learned more of how our government worked because we had a class called "Government." Even then, I didn't realize the importance of it and didn't really understand the impact it had on my life.

I learned more as I became old enough to vote. I don't think that I had to register with a particular party the first time I voted, but my memory may be faulty (it's been a few years since that first vote). I do remember registering as an independent in the first state my new husband and I lived in. And I recall hearing (not really researching it for myself) that the Democratic Party was the "tax and spend" party and that the Republican Party was the party of values and morals.

Through the years, I have always tried to vote my conscience. Or at least the "least of two evils." Sometimes that meant not voting for a specific position like senate seat or even president. In case you haven't noticed, politics has become, shall we say, much more polarized. What saddens me is the number of Christians, and yes, Adventist Christians, who have brought that polarization into the church. And who share the views of the polarized over the love that Jesus has for us. (Oops, I think I stepped on a few toes – and believe me, I am not guiltless in this, but I am allowing God to work on my compassion, on my love for others.)

Back to the original question. To whom do you owe allegiance? I invite you to look at the back of a baptismal certificate for the Seventh-day Adventist church. On the current ones we have in the conference office, there are 13 commitments to which a baptism candidate agrees. The first one is there is one God comprised of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. The seventh one states "I look forward to the soon coming of Jesus . ... I will witness to His loving salvation, and by life and word help others to be ready for His glorious appearing."

The last one is the most striking to me during this time, especially the last half of the first sentence: "that people of every nation, race, and language are invited and accepted into its fellowship." As a baptized Seventh-day Adventist Christian, I agreed that I believed in all of these commitments.

I think of several verses from Scripture that tell me how to live with others. In Romans 12:18 ESV, Paul gives us this instruction: "If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all."

In the parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10:25-37, in verses 36 and 37, Jesus asked the lawyer who was shown to be a neighbor to the man who was accosted and beaten by robbers. We all know the ending – it was the Samaritan, the one who showed him mercy.

In John 13:34-35 ESV, after Judas had left the last supper, Jesus gave this to the remaining disciples: "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

If you would, ask yourself who has your allegiance. For me, I choose to prioritize my allegiance as follows: I am first a child of God. Next, I am part of an earthly family – husband, children, grandchildren, siblings, parents, etc. Third, I am an American who votes my conscience. What defines me, though, is I am a child of God. As God's child, I must show myself to be His disciple, by loving others, just as God loves me.
